# National Youth Leadership Training For ITC in 05

Formerly known as Junior Leadership Training, NYLT makes its debut in the Iroquois Trail Council starting Jan 05. Jack Vosburg, Dave Hawley and myself attended the NYLT training conference at Camp Alpine in NJ in October, and were greeted by many enthusiastic NYLT test pilot troops.

Major changes in the program include female youth participation is now possible, GPS training is to replace map and compass, and the program has been condensed to six days from the previous seven. The age requirement is now 14 years old, but the rank requirement remains the same, at a minimum of First Class. As it has been, scouts attending the conference are expected to know their scout skills (including map and compass), and should be your current or future Senior Patrol Leaders, Patrol Leaders, Crew Presidents & Vice Presidents. The principle function is to help adult advisors instill their top youth leaders with the skills of leadership. In the words of Robert Baden -Powell, we want to "Train Scouts to do a job, then let them do it".

Scouts and Scouters, this is an excellent opportunity to learn skills that will improve your Troops and Crews today, and instill leadership skills that will last a lifetime for tomorrow. For the people that take it to heart, I've seen good Scouts go in and honed leaders come out.

The dates of the conference are August 13- 20, at Camp Dittmer in Phelps NY. For an Informational brochure, please feel free to call me at (716) 625-9487. There are a limited amount of positions open and they will be available to qualified Scouts on a first come first serve basis.

First, the Team should not be just a small number of Arrowmen, who are willing to "perform" in front of people. The ideal Team would include the necessary "behind the scenes" people, who would do important prep work on the trails, council fires, and so on. There should be at least two EXPERIENCED torch bearers in the group, because that part can make or break the Ceremony before it even gets started. It is also important to have some experienced Brothers to choose from, who have been touched by the Scout Spirit and are committed to the ideals of the WWW, to take Brotherhood Candidates on their "Search for truth" Walk.

Ceremonies involves work in many different forms, but it also yields satisfaction, a sense of accomplishment, and a close knit group. The Team is working to revitalize its costumes, with a gradual switch to a more local "flavour", and there is plenty of room in the Team for new members who are seriously interested.

# Lodge 2005 Dues Payable

January brings the start of a new year. Please be aware that 2005 lodge dues are now due. During this past year an effort has been made to enter / update / correct all name / data information in coordination to address labels. The update has lead to entering email addresses and cleaning up the listing of "paid --- current" Order of the Arrow members. You should be asked to view a current roster and data file to verify as to its correctness.

Dues are \$6.00 per year. \$12.00 will reactivate delinquent members by paying last year and the current year. Thank you for bringing yourself up to date on your dues status.

### DID YOU KNOW....

- -OA members are elected by both non-OA and OA members from within their unit (Troop or Crew)
- -You must be a Registered Boy Scout, First Class Rank and have 15 nights of tent camping in the past 2 years to qualify for an OA election
- -You can be between the ages of 11 and 21 to be elected, One adult can be chosen by your committee per year if at least one boy is elected
- -If your Troop uses Troopmaster software and the information is current, it will automatically generate an OA eligibility report
- -The OA is an organization that serves both Camp Dittmer and Sam Wood, and one of it's main function is camp promotion. It's also fun!
- -The Order of the Arrow is known as Scouting's National Honor Society, it is an honor to be voted in
- -Although many people pass the Ordeal Weekend, joining the ranks of Brotherhood seals your membership
- -The OA is a Scout run organization. The adults main function is to transport and facilitate
- -Unit elections (Troop or Crew) should be held in Jan or Early Feb, but can be held at Camp Dittmer as well (only one per year though)
- -Arrowmen can become OA Troop Representative (that counts for advancement), and take part in conducting the unit elections
- -Unit election information can be obtained by contacting either Scout Office Lockport 716.434.2851 or Batavia 585.343.0307 Thanks.
