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
rules around the first of Jan. The new forms will be enclosed for them to have filled out before an election is done. Again this form needs to be filled out completely.

Fall Fellowship



A Brother's Journey

My first real experience of the Ashokwahta Ceremonies Team occurred, like many, during the weekend of my Ordeal. I recall being so entranced by the impressive regalia and stately figures that I knew without hesitation that I wanted to be a part of it somehow, in some way. So I talked to a few people, sent an email or two and before I knew it there I was dressed in the regalia of Meteu, nervously waiting for the candidates to arrive for their Pre-Ordeal Ceremony. I am sure I was far from perfect. In fact I can guarantee it, but that didn't matter. I had just cleared the first (and arguably the largest) hurdle of being a Ceremonies Team Member.

The following day we prepared as a team for the Ordeal Ceremony and that evening we did just fine. And with each successive Ceremony is has become a more enjoyable and more fulfilling experience. Each year has had its own unique challenges and obstacles, but we have overcome these. Everyone came together and worked as a unit to make the experience lasting for the candidates. Each year has seen new members enter the group and our team has grown bigger and stronger and our ceremonies have reflected this. When I first entered the group it was commonplace to see someone during the ceremony with paper and flashlight in hand. That is now a thing of the past. Occasionally things were missing and we would have to improvise props. This is no longer the case.

Being a member of this team has allowed me the opportunity to truly dive into and better understand the ceremonies and why things are the way they are. Everything in the ceremonies has significance and we are able to better 100ft above the lake. All was well until we stopped to refill on water by filtering out of the lake. When we stopped all sorts of bugs and flies came out and started to bite us.

After another mile or so of hiking, we finally made it in to our camp by Trappers Lake. We made dinner and set up camp without any problem until I was informed that one of our scouts was not prepared. Being the crew leader of the group I had to solve the issue. It turned out that the scout left the tent poles for his and his buddy's tent back at Cole. Since it was late, I split the pair into other tents and we all got a good night's rest.

Following the same pattern we all got up early, broke camp, ate breakfast, and were on our way to our next camp site at Au sable Point. This day was cooler and less buggy. At one point on the trail we knew we were back on the cliffs but we found what appeared to be a beach on top of the cliff. It was pretty spectacular. We finished that days hike by seeing the giant sand dunes that we would face the next day.

Important Dues note

If the first line of your mailing label on this newsletter reads dues paid thru 2010, this is your last mailing you will receive from the lodge until you become paid up with your dues. You can do that by paying 8 dollars a year back dues and 8 dollars for the current year.

You are considered a current member only if you are paid up for the current year. The dues year ends on the last day of the calendar year.

We have corrected our records to coincide with the National rules, so only current dues paid members are listed with National. We still send our mailings out to those who are slightly behind. Current dues paid up has become a requirement for advancement to the rank of Brotherhood.

You can make payment at either office or over the phone.

New OA Awards

There are 3 new Unit of Excellence Awards available for the Lodge to award to units or members within their Council units.

Note: The OA Troop/Team Representative Adviser is a new, official BSA adult position of responsibility that has been created in conjunction with this award. Its purpose is to create the role for an adult to guide the youth Troop/team Representative and be a 'voice of the Order' at the adult level in the troop structure.

Order of the Arrow Scoutmaster of Excellence:

Lead your unit in earning the **OA Unit of Excellence Award** three times during your tenure as Scoutmaster.

Order of the Arrow Troop/Team Representative of Excellence:

Lead your unit in earning the **OA Unit of Excellence Award** during your tenure as a Troop/Team Representative.

Order of the Arrow Troop/Team Representative Adviser of Excellence:

Advise at least two Troop Representatives towards earning the **OA Unit of Excellence Award** during your tenure as Troop Representative Adviser.

The complete rules for earning this awards will be passed out at the Winter Banquet, as well as be mailed to all Scoutmasters and Committee Chairmen.

Revised New Member Rules

Each year, upon holding a troop or team election for youth candidates, that results in at least one youth candidate being elected, the unit committee may nominate registered unit adults (age 21 or over) to the lodge adult selection committee. The number of adults nominated can be no more than one-third of the number of youth candidates elected, rounded up where the number of youth candidates is not a multiple of three. In addition to the one-third limit, the unit committee may nominate the currently-serving unit leader (but not assistant leaders), as long as he or she has served as unit leader for at least the previous 12 months. Recommendations of the adult selection committee, the lodge Key Three, with the approval of the Scout executive, serving as Supreme Chief of the Fire, will be candidates for induction, provided all conditions are fulfilled.

The camping requirement set forth for youth candidates must be fulfilled by adults for them to be considered. To be eligible, the adult must have completed 15 days and nights of Boy Scout camping during the two-year period prior to nomination. The 15 days and nights must include one, but no more than one, long-term camp consisting of six consecutive days and five nights of resident camping, approved and under the auspices and standards of the BSA. The balance must be overnight, weekend, or other short-term camps. Include above the dates and location of the resident camping experience on the nomination form.

The rules for youth election to be a candidate have not changed. They must be first class and meet the camping requirements that are listed above. They must also have the approval of the scoutmaster. Then, their name must be on at least half the ballots cast. There is no limit to the number of youth that a scout can vote for.

Our Obligation

"I do hereby promise on my honor as a Scout, that I will always and faithfully observe and preserve the traditions of the Order of the Arrow."

This is the first sentence of the obligation that all members take upon joining the Order. But what does it mean? Have you ever thought about the deeper meaning of the obligation we make as members of the OA?

Notice the Scout Oath and Scout Law are not mentioned. There's no need to do so because we promise on our honor as Scouts, implying that we do our best to live up to the principles of the Oath and Law in our daily lives. It is the next part of this sentence that may be confusing to some.

We obligate ourselves to observe and preserve the traditions of the OA. What are these traditions? Is it the sash and flap, regalia, and ceremonies? Or could it possibly be something with more meaning?

Co-Founder Carroll A. Edson, Jr. attended the Lodge #339 Winter Banquet in either 1975 or 1976. I had the honor and privilege of speaking with him. During our conversation Mr. Edson clarified that the traditions we preserve extend to the entire Scouting experience. By promoting camping at all levels, we ensure that those who follow are afforded the same opportunities we have had to enjoy the Scouting experience.

The next time you have the opportunity to join in repeating the obligation, think of the deeper purpose behind the words. In the words of Meteu:

"We who love the woods and camping,
We who strive in cheerful service,
Stand beside and urge them forward,
On the next step of their journey ..."
